Rosary is said before morning Mass at 7.05am on Tuesday and Thursdays.

COVID-19 update

In keeping with NSW Health directives, anyone attending a church now must wear a face mask. Children under the age of 12 are exempt from this rule, but are encouraged to wear face masks where practicable.

NSW Health can impose a \$200 fine on each individual failing to abide by this rule.

Up to 100 people can attend Masses as well as other ceremonies including funerals, baptisms and weddings, providing a four square metre rule is observed.

QR codes are now compulsory for churches to ensure there is a record kept for all attendees. However in cases where you have parishioners unable to use a QR code, in these cases, the parish must keep an electronic record of that person's name and contact details.

Our Covid-19 Safety Plan (copy available in Church) states :

- 1. All must be aware of content of Safety Plan.

Ordinary Time

Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. The Church year begins with Advent, followed immediately by the Christmas season. Ordinary Time begins on the Monday after the first Sunday after January 6, the traditional date of the Feast of the Epiphany and the end of the liturgical season of Christmas. This first period of Ordinary Time runs until Ash Wednesday when the liturgical season of Lent begins. Both Lent and the Easter season fall outside of Ordinary Time, which resumes again on the Monday after Pentecost Sunday the end of the Easter season. This second period of Ordinary Time runs until the First Sunday of Advent, when the liturgical year begins again. As feasts of our Lord, both the Baptism of the Lord and Epiphany displace a Sunday in Ordinary Time. Thus the first Sunday in the period of Ordinary Time is the Sunday that falls after the first week of Ordinary Time, which makes it the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time. In any given year, there are either 33 or 34 Sundays in Ordinary Time. The liturgical colour for Ordinary Time is green. This is to represent the time of growth and expansion of the Church following the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Green is a very natural color, and is often a symbol for growth and new life. Like all liturgical seasons, Ordinary Time is meant to be lived! Participating in Ordinary Time means participating in the everyday life of Jesus.

Here's a short list of ways you can fully embrace this liturgical season and get caught up in Christ:

Examine your habits. A great new habit to start: reading the daily Gospel.

Gratitude. Joy always finds its root in gratitude. Try starting each day by thanking God for five ordinary, everyday things. Use your imagination to reflect on the daily life of Jesus. Make yourself a bystander to the Gospel stories in your imagination.

Ordinary Time is anything but ordinary. But the true power of the season is only unlocked if you live it!

St Agnes

St. Agnes of Rome was born in 291 AD Agnes was very beautiful and belonged to a wealthy Christian family. Many high ranking men wanted to marry her. Whenever a man wished to marry Agnes, she would always say, "Jesus Christ is my only Spouse." According to legend, the young men she turned away became so angry by her devotion to God that they began to submit her name to authorities as a Christian follower.

Procop, the Governor's son, became very angry when she refused him. He tried to win her for his wife with rich gifts and promises, but Agnes kept saying, "I am already promised to the Lord of the Universe and He has said He will never leave me!". Agnes was condemned to death. Even the pagans cried to see such a young and beautiful girl going to death. Yet, Agnes did not pay attention to those who begged her to save herself. "I would offend my Spouse," she said, "if I were to try to please you. He chose me first and He shall have me!" Then she prayed and bowed her head for the death-stroke of the sword.
