Rosary is said before morning Mass at 7.05am on Tuesday and Thursdays.

COVID-19 update

In keeping with NSW Health directives, anyone attending a church now must wear a face mask. Children under the age of 12 are exempt from this rule, but are encouraged to wear face masks where practicable.

NSW Health can impose a \$200 fine on each individual failing to abide by this rule. Up to 100 people can attend Masses as well as other ceremonies including funerals, baptisms and weddings, providing a four square metre rule is observed.

QR codes are now compulsory for churches to ensure there is a record kept for all attendees. However in cases where you have parishioners unable to use a QR code, in these cases, the parish must keep an electronic record of that person's name and contact details.

Happy Australia Day

Australia Day is the official national day of Australia. Celebrated annually on 26 January, it marks the anniversary of the 1788 arrival of the First Fleet of British ships at Port Jackson, New South Wales, and the raising of the Flag of Great Britain at Sydney Cove by Governor Arthur Phillip. Plenty to see and do on Australia Day. Here are some Fun Facts: The Emu and the Kangaroo are on our coat of arms because neither animal can walk backwards. They always move for-

wards, symbolising Australia's desire to do the same. We are the only continent without an active volcano. The wine cask is an Australian invention. A Brissie bloke tried to sell New Zealand on Ebay in 2006. The price rose to \$3,000 before eBay closed the auction. Our former Prime Minister Bob Hawke set a world record for sculling 2.5 pints of beer in 11 seconds. If all of the shells on the roof of the Sydney Opera House were combined, they would create a perfect sphere. The story goes that the architect was inspired while eating an orange. Damper is a traditional Australian soda bread, historically prepared by swagmen, and other travellers.

Conversion of St Paul

Saul, which is Paul's given name, was born into a Jewish family in Tarsus (Turkey) around the year A.D. 8; he was also a Roman citizen. Schooled as a Pharisee, he was a tent maker by trade, but was most noted for his hatred of Christians. He believed the teachings of Jesus violated Mosaic Law and harassed, and even jailed, anyone who followed those teachings. Most Christians know the story of what happened on the Damascus road: the bright light that knocked Saul down, the voice of Jesus, Saul's blindness and immediate response to the calling of Christ. Blinded from his encounter with Jesus, he allowed himself to be led into Damascus where he was baptized, after which he set out to spread the news of Jesus. Paul was confronted, jailed (though angels rescued him), physically abused and repeatedly endangered and harassed for preaching the message he previously attacked. Despite all the dangers he encountered, Paul never faltered or failed his God. In the end, he would be taken to Rome as a prisoner and be beheaded for his teachings.
